Cornwall Council and Cornwall Energy Recovery Limited (CERL) are working together to ensure Cornwall's waste is managed sustainably, helping tackle the climate emergency and protecting its unique environment.

Cornwall Energy Recovery Limited is made up of three shareholders: Foresight Group, I-Environment Investments, and SUEZ recycling and recovery UK. In addition to being a shareholder, SUEZ is responsible for day-to-day operation and maintenance of the network of facilities that manage Cornwall's household waste.

Our visitor centre at Cornwall Energy Recovery Centre remained very popular, receiving 923 visitors. Whilst our Bodmin Materials Recycling Facility underwent redevelopment we offered exciting and stimulating virtual tours to schools and adult interest groups.

The education team supported projects such as helping to clear vegetation from the grounds of ClayTawc Community Centre in St Dennis. We also established a pioneering collaboration with The Wave Project charity and Cornwall Council to introduce a wetsuit reuse initiative. Wetsuits are now being collected at several sites and reused by The Wave Project to help young people with mental health issues by offering surf therapy.
